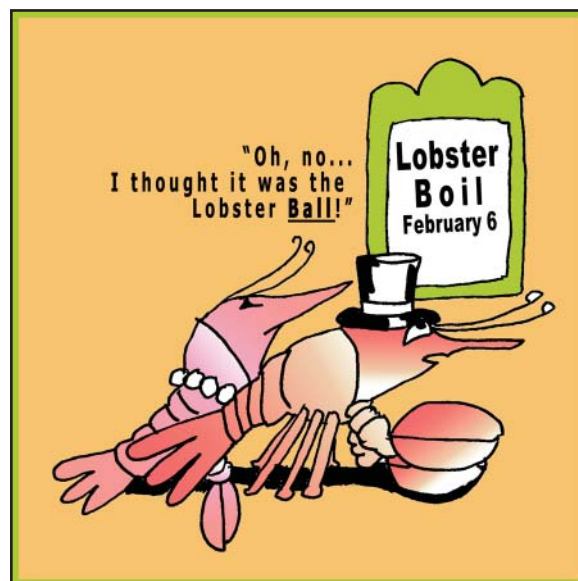

**Advent Campaign to "Buy A Brick, Build A School" Huge Success**

Responding to Bishop Joseph's call about the need for education in Sudan, and more specifically, his desire to build a secondary school in Renk Town in the Diocese of Renk, we launched the "Buy a Brick, Build a School" campaign at Christ Church during Advent. You responded overwhelmingly to this need by donating over 600 "bricks," providing just over \$6,000 to the building fund. We have parishioners George and Amanda Hanley to thank for their leadership in this fundraising effort, who pledged two very generous \$10,000 matching gifts for the construction of the school.

The first matching gift challenge was met at the Diocese of Chicago's Convention in November, where we raised \$10,335 for the school in just two days. With Bishop Lee's blessings, the offering at the Eucharist, which totaled \$15,000, was split between our two Companion Dioceses of SE Mexico and Renk, with the Renk portion designated for the new secondary school. An additional \$2,835 was raised through the "Buy a Brick" campaign. Even without reports from the other parishes in our diocese that participated in the "Buy a Brick" Advent campaign, we are well on our way to the second \$10,000 matching gift.

The initial phase of construction is expected to cost \$37,500, and will include a large brick building with a zinc roof, latrines, and cisterns for collecting rain water. Additional funds will be used for supplies, a library, a science lab, and an office and storage space. The school will be located on land already owned by the Diocese of Renk and they plan to break ground very soon.

Bishop Joseph sends his heartfelt thanks to all of those who helped make this dream a reality.

The Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30) reminds us that we all have talents – gifts, abilities, resources – that are to be invested and multiplied. This Lenten Season, we will all be asked this simple question: What's YOUR talent? Have an answer already? Great! Still thinking? That's OK, too. Let's make it more concrete. If you were given a small sum of money, how could you use YOUR talents, your energy, your creativity, to turn that small sum into a larger sum? If you had \$100, what would you do?

How can I house, feed, clothe, and educate my children? ## A Few Suggestions to Get Your Brain Waves Working

Invite several of your friends to a gourmet dinner at your house. Charge each friend the amount that they would normally pay for a night out. You have now taken \$100 and multiplied it. An average dinner out would probably cost around \$60 or more per couple. Invite four couples and you have more than quadrupled your money.

Use your money to host a parent's night out. Offer group babysitting while the parents enjoy a night on the town. Rent a movie, buy a few snacks, print a few fliers, and you are all set. The average cost of a sitter is \$13.00 and hour. Imagine how quickly the money would add up with just a few children.

Purchase flour, sugar, etc. Bake massive batches of cookies. Go door to door in your neighborhood selling a dozen at a time. Always mention why you are doing it and people will respond just as you hope they would.

## Sowing the Seeds of Stability: An ERD Success Story

The future looks brighter today than it has for a long time, according to Beatrice, a resident of Palaka, a small village along Lake Victoria in western Kenya. Like many women in the region, Beatrice lost children to AIDS and is now responsible for the care of her grandchildren. For years, her only assets were two acres of land, which she and her husband cultivated for their income. However, they simply couldn't earn enough to feed all the children and make ends meet.

Through a partnership with the Ecumenical Church Loan Fund, Episcopal Relief & Development provided Beatrice and a group of women in her community with training and seed money. They were encouraged to grow sunflowers, as sunflower oil is a daily staple in the region and the process for extracting the oil requires only a small investment in a simple machine. Half of Beatrice's land is now devoted to growing sunflowers. She can sell both the sunflower oil and the sunflower seeds for income. Together with the other women in her group, she learned to place bee hives in close proximity to the sunflower fields, allowing them to extract flavorful honey and sell it locally. For Beatrice, Episcopal Relief & Development's assistance has brought her financial stability, progress and hope for her grandchildren's future.
