Now is a great time to be a part of the Christ Church community. Your generous gifts back to God in response to God's grace and love make an incredible impact at Christ Church and beyond. We continue to build a vibrant community, welcome new members, and remain committed to helping others, while wisely using the resources entrusted to us. Below are some of the highlights from 2024 thus far.

Thank you again for your generosity of time, participation and treasure, which helps make all this possible.

99th Fall Rummage Sale will enable us to distribute \$210,000 of Benevolence Grants to 60 organizations this spring. Our historic 100th Sale is October 3rd.

Recognized in our Community with the *"Community of Caring Award"* from Bishop Anderson House and by the Winnetka Northfield Glencoe Chamber of Commerce's *"Pillar of the Community"* award for Christ Church Rummage.

New Epiphany Door Chalking and Blessing tradition with over 35 parishioners' doors chalked.

Family Promise added an additional week of hosting families in need of transitional housing.

Children and Youth Ministries continue to grow with over 250 children and youth registered in our programs from Pre-K to High School.

Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper and Palm Burning drew over 100 participants and this year added an exciting service that created ashes for next year's Ash Wednesday services.

Our Choir traveled to Boston in March singing at Trinity Church, Boston and All Saints Church, Worcester, MA.

New Weekly Lenten Inter-Generational Service Program put our hearts and hands to work in service of others.

Expanded Holy Week Services included 16 services with worship on Holy Monday—Wednesday in the Maple Street Chapel; Leslie Hunter, Chaplain of Holy Family Ministries, preached on Maundy Thursday; an Overnight Prayer Vigil from Maundy Thursday through Good Friday; St. James the Less, and St. Augustine's clergy and parishioners joined us for the Great Vigil of Easter; joy-filled celebrations on Easter Day with packed services, glorious music and our annual Churchyard Easter Egg hunt.

Community Building Events included a delightful Rectory Open House in January, a super-fun Progressive Dinner in March, and five new themed Sunday Suppers at Church on the Hill.

Your continued involvement and support of our parish makes all these events, ministries and mission possible as Christ Church continues to experience and share God's love and glory.

A Reading from The Acts of the Apostles

When the day of Pentecost had come, the disciples were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs-- in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

The Collect o the Day "collects" our individual thoughts into unified prayer that we might respond to the lessons we are about to hear. But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.' "

We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words. And God, who searches the heart, knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people. Thanks be to God.

The Holy Gospel

John 15:26-27; 16:4b-15

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

Jesus said to his disciples, "When the Advocate comes, whom I will send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who comes from the Father, he will testify on my behalf. You also are to testify because you have been with me from the beginning.

"I did not say these things to you from the beginning, because I was with you. But now I am going to him who sent me; yet none of you asks me, 'Where are you going?' But because I have said these things to you, sorrow has filled your hearts. Nevertheless I tell you the truth: it is to your advantage that I go away, for if I do not go away, the Advocate will not come to you; but if I go, I will send him to you. And when he comes, he will prove the world wrong about sin and righteousness and judgment: about sin, because they do not believe in me; about righteousness, because I am going to the Father and you will see me no longer; about judgment, because the ruler of this world has been condemned.

"I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now. When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth; for he will not speak on his own, but will speak whatever he hears, and he will declare to you the things that are to come. He will glorify me, because he will take what is mine and declare it to you. All that the Father has is mine. For this reason I said that he will take what is mine and declare it to you.


The Sanctus, which begins "Holy, holy, holy," is a hymn of remembrance, consecration, and praise where our voices echo the voices of the angels who eternally praise God with these words. Our worship also includes the Benedictus, "Blessed is the one," a Christological acclamation of the coming of Christ into the world, taken from Matthew's gospel.

Standing is the historical posture of prayer, as is reinforced in the words of our Eucharistic Prayer, "...and made us worthy to stand before you."
