The Holy Season of Epiphany: Light, Manger, Magi, Revelation

The Episcopal Church says the following about the Season of Epiphany:

"A season of four to nine weeks, from the Feast of the Epiphany (January 6), through the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. The length of the season varies according to the date of Easter. The gospel stories of this season describe various events that manifest the divinity of Jesus. The coming of the Magi is celebrated on the Epiphany... We are called to respond to Christ in faith through the showings of his divinity recorded in the gospels of the Epiphany season."



This year we have five of the possible Sundays that stretch from January 7 to February 11. Each day of Epiphanytide we gain several minutes of daylight—literally there is more light in our lives. During our worship services we will hear gospel stories primarily from Mark's gospel. Almost all the gospel passages focus on the ways that Jesus revealed to his disciples and the world that he was the Christ, the light of the world.

We would like to start a new tradition here at Christ Church: chalking the door to one's home in the season of Epiphany. This tradition started in medieval times in central Europe. The custom is practiced by millions of Christians around the world today and is rooted in the visitation of the "wise men from the East" to the infant Jesus and his parents. As one canon of the Church of England wrote so eloquently, "It is, moreover, a constant reminder that Christ is incarnate in the love and care we show each other in our ordinary lives together, and also our relationship with friends and strangers who cross the threshold of our homes in the course of the year."

We invite you into this holy time of revelation of Christ to the world, where the days become longer, the light brighter, and we look for how Jesus has been revealed to us in our lives.



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
