The "New" Ancient Tradition of Holy Week at Christ Church

When "the new" 1979 Book of Common Prayer was published, there was a rather curious assumption made: People won't come to church between Palm Sunday and Easter Day. This is one of the reasons why we hear the entire story of Holy Week read on Palm Sunday—so that those who attend church on Palm Sunday and do not attend Holy Week services will understand the significance of that last week of Jesus' life and will be able to participate more fully in the joy of Easter morning.

Holy Week is the culmination and summation of the life and ministry of Jesus and therefore is paramount for our understanding of our faith. The full schedule of services for Holy Week 2024 is found on the back cover of our bulletin.

You are invited to come to each of the services and to participate fully in Holy Week so that as we journey with Jesus during the last week of his life, we may more fully understand the incredible depth of love that God has for each of us.

Holy Week provides a fertile seedbed for the roots of our faith to take hold, to grow and be nourished. Each day presents us with a new understanding of Jesus' life and the impact that life can have on us today. So, let us make time in our busy lives for the deepening of our faith during Holy Week.

A Reading from the Book of Jeremiah

31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. 
The Collect of the Day "collects" our

A Reading from Paul's Letter to the Hebrews

5:5-10

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you";

as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."

The Holy Gospel

John 12:20-33

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. *Glory to you, Lord Christ.*

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.





Sometimes I feel discouraged and think my work in vain, but then the Holy Spirit revives my soul again.


